
Key Facts

Many of Gormley's most famous works are based on the human form. He used his own body as a basis for these, remaking his body in concrete, lead and iron. Gormley attended Trinity College, Cambridge University, where he studied, archaeology, anthropology and the history of art.

Gormley's wife, Vicken Parsons, is also an artist, painting mainly in oils but also creating some sculpture.




Rodin's *The Thinker* (1904)

Field (1991)

Made of approximately 35,000 individual terracotta figures, made by a team of sculptors. It is impossible to see every figure do you think they are around corners where they can't be seen?

Another Place (1997) This sculpture, which is covered by the tide twice a day, is made from rusting metal and is gradually being covered with barnacles. It has been on several beaches around Europe, but is now permanently at Crosbie.

Angel of the North (1998) Many people were opposed the to the Angel before it was erected, but it is now extremely popular as a symbol of North East England It reflects the industrial heritage of the area, but does not represent any single person.

Pinch pot Pot made from one piece of clay by squeezing/ shaping clay between thumb and fingers. Coil pot Pot made from coiling

Slip Very watery clay used to strengthen joints.
