### Key Question

## How and Why do People Try and Make the World a Better Place?

#### Topic Overview

- Think about some of the ways in which the world is not such a good place: you could start small and local, and end up big and global e.g. from upsetting people in the dinner queue through to messing up the environment.
- Look at how religions suggest that people need help and guidance to live in the right way.
- Explore the Jewish new year festival for trees (Tu B'shevat) and how that can 'mend the world'.
- Find out about zakah, and how Muslims give to charity, eg www.muslimhands.org.uk, and find out how and why they help to make the world a better place.
- Explore the lives of inspirational Christians Desmond Tutu and Martin Luther King Jr. Consider how their religious faith inspired and guided them in their lives, and their contribution to making the world a better place.
- Compare non-religious ways of 'being good without God'.
- Reflect on the value of love, forgiveness, honesty, kindness, generosity and service in their own lives and the lives of others.

### Learning Outcomes

- Identify some beliefs about why the world is not always a good place (e.g. Christian ideas of sin).
- Make links between religious beliefs and teachings and why people try
  to live and make the world a better place.
- Make simple links between teachings about how to live and ways in which people try to make the world a better place.
- Describe some examples of how people try to live.
- Identify some differences in how people put their beliefs into action.
- Raise questions and suggest answers about why the world is not always a good place, and what are the best ways of making it better.
- Make links between some commands for living from religious traditions, non-religious worldviews and pupils' own ideas.
- Express ideas about the best ways to make the world a better place, making links with religious ideas studied, giving justification.
